REFLECTIONS ON 2014 ESAI CONFERENCE

The 2014 conference **Imagining and Innovating for Sustainable Futures; Education in Challenging Times** washeld at the Sheraton Hotel, Athlone. A very well-attended conference heard papers from a variety of participants, including academic researchers, graduate students and educational practitioners. It is this diversity of participation and of research modes that characterises ESAI. Here were some of the highlights:

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Dr Rose Malone, gave the Presidential keynote *A Curriculum for Sustainability? Dilemmas and Choices*, with a response by Prof. Emer Smyth.

We held three ESAI Professional Development Workshops

- Meet the Editors! Publishing with Irish Educational Studies: An overview of the review process, led by the IES Editorial Board
- Prof. Gary Granville led an ESAI-IACD (Irish Association for Curriculum Development) Sponsored Workshop Educators as curriculum change agents: challenging, preparing and supporting educators to be proactive in developing curricula
- Negotiating Ethical Dilemmas in the Research Process: A workshop on negotiating the issues relating to ethical dilemmas in educational research, with a view to developing a framework for ethically sound educational research, led by members of the ESAI Executive

Reflecting collaboration across the ESAI research community, three Symposia were held:

- Symposium on Bulling
- Symposium on Arts as Activism
- Symposium on Understanding and enhancing literacy in post-primary schools

CALL FOR APPLICATIONS OF INTEREST FOR POSTGRADUATE REPRESENTATION ON ESAI EXECUTIVE (TWO POSITIONS)

At the most recent AGM in Athlone, we reported a recent decline in the number of *Associate* (postgraduate student) members in the ESAI. In an attempt to improve the membership base and better represent the research community, we sought permission at the AGM to co-opt a number of Postgraduate representatives on to the ESAI Executive.

The ESAI Executive invites applications for two positions of Postgraduate Representative. The call for positions are on also on the ESAI website. The new Postgraduate Representatives will be working alongside the President and current ESAI Executive team. It is expected that the new Postgraduate Representatives will reflect the geographical diversity of the postgraduate student body to include Northern Ireland and the Irish Diaspora, and other professions where education is a key area, in terms of inter professional education.

As these are new posts, the exact duties of the Postgraduate Representatives are not yet defined. However, general duties are likely to include reviewing the work of ESAI/IES from a postgraduate perspective, and devising initiatives to attract post-graduate students to ESAI. Postgraduate representatives will be co-opted for a 2-year term.

Issues in 2014:

Since 2012 each volume of the IES journal comprises four issues. In 2014, one of the four issues was a special issue titled: *Investment in Education and the intractability of inequality* edited by John Walsh (TCD), Selina McCoy (ESRI/TCD) – both guest editors – along with Aidan Seery and Paul Conway. The well-attended launch of the special issue by Minister Jan O'Sullivan, TD, took place in the Royal Hibernian Academy on the 8th of October. 



Co-Editor and Reviews Editor Positions

The Executive of the Educational Studies Association of Ireland (ESAI, <u>www.esai.ie</u>) invites applications for the positions of Co-Editor and Reviews Editor of *Irish Educational Studies*, the official journal of the ESAI. *Irish Educational Studies* focuses on a range of topics relevant to education, drawing on the full spectrum of disciplines and methodological approaches that inform educational research, including anthropology, sociology, psychology, history, economics, philosophy, politics and curriculum studies. The journal is currently ranked in the Thompson Reuters Social Science Citation Index (SSCI)[™]. The call for applications for these new positions is motivated by a substantial increase in submissions to the journal since its inclusion on the Social Science Citation Index, the move to the ScholarOne online management system and the expansion from three to four issues per year.

The new Co-Editor will be working alongside the current editorial team. The current team consists of Paul Conway and Aisling Leavy (General Editors) and Emer Smyth, Maeve O'Brien and Aidan Seery (Co-Editors). It is expected that the new Co-Editor and Reviews Editor will add to the disciplinary and geographical diversity of the current team.

The *Co-Editor* will be responsible for management of peer-review and editorial processes. These processes include determining the composition of the reviewer pool, guiding manuscripts through the review process using a web-based system, over seeing revisions, the initiation and management of special issues, initiating and conducting communication with prospective authors, reviewers, associate editors, ESAI Executive and association members as well as others stakeholders. This initial assignment would be for a 3-year term.

The *Reviews Editor* will be responsible for contacting publishers to secure books to review, identifying and distributing books to suitable reviewers, and readying reviews prior to final publication. Although there is no fixed number of books to review per issue, we anticipate that between 2 and 3 book reviews will be published each year. This initial assignment would be for a 3-year term.

EERA Update

The most recent EERA Council meeting was held in Budapest in January 2015. The official journal of EE-RA, *European Educational Research Journal (EERJ)* is in the process of moving from Sympoisum to Sage, and two new co-editors have been appointed: Eric

Mangez and Maarten Simons. Eric Mangez is Professor of Sociology of Education at the University of Louvain (UCL), Belgium and Maarten Simons is Professor of Education Policy and Theory at the Laboratory for Education and Society of the KU Leuven (KUL) Belgium.



EERA participates in a number of European projects and international partnerships. Its current focus is on the upcoming European framework programme, 'Horizon 2020'. More recently, EERA has adopted a political role advocating protection of funds for social science research and educational research and is in constant contact with EU and Horizon 2020 to increase pool of resources for social science research. However, it has recently become apparent Horizon 2020 has already suffered from budget cuts between the original and final proposals. Any additional cuts on the funding programmes of Horizon 2020 would seriously endanger its essential contribution to the solution of urgent societal problems and impacts on Europe's economy.

EERA are now members of the European Alliance for Social Sciences and Humanities (EASHH). EASHH aims to bring together scientific networks, associations and disciplines to promote European social sciences and humanities. EERA are also a member of Initiative for Science in Europe (ISE) which focuses on the role of science in policy making. The 2016 EERA Conference is likely to be held in either Dublin or Glasgow, however a decision has not yet been reached at this point.

For many years, the ESAI Executive has submitted a symposium involving ESAI members, ensuring a range of institutions are represented with a symposium theme that provides some scope for a range of inputs and perspectives. Symposium Title: 'A perspective from Ireland on Toward Justice: Culture, Language, and Heritage in Education Research and Praxis'

The theme of the Educational Studies Association of Ireland (ESAI) symposium draws heavily on the theme of the AERA annual conference, prompting us 'to consider how education praxis, research, theory, and policy can change the world—toward more justice'. In this symposium, we examine interpretations of the meaning of culture, language, and heritage in education research and praxis with the aim of advancing justice, in the Irish context. Papers in the symposium represent contributions from researchers and educators working collaboratively across higher education institutions.

Chair: Dr Conor Galvin, Director of Graduate Studies at UCD College of Human Sciences, and Vice-President of the Education Studies Association of Ireland.

Paper 1: Language(s) in education and society in Ireland North and South: 'The longed-for tidal wave of Justice can rise up, and hope and history rhyme' (Seamus Heaney).

Social and educational policy documentation in the EU, Ireland and the UK aspire to language policies and practices which develop multilingualism and a respect for heritage and interculturalism, while promoting the knowledge economy. This paper will discuss how the plethora of policy papers and reports currently circulating might be harnessed to integrate the languages of business, diplomacy, heritage, lifestyle, community and newcomers. The particular challenge facing Ireland is how linguistic diversity can be accommodated in a society where it often seems that 'English is Enough.' The role of Irish is central to these considerations. Although the first official language in the Republic, in Northern Ireland Irish is controversial and has been described as "the green litmus paper of community relations".

Dr Eugene McKendry, School of Education, Queen's University Belfast

Paper 2: Multilingualism challenges and opportunities in the Irish Post-primary education sector.

The linguistic and cultural dimensions of Irish society are a rich tapestry of official bilingualism overlaid with a vibrant multilingualism (Census 2011, Eurobarometer 2012). While the National Strategy Literacy and Numeracy for Learning and Life (LNLL) (DES, 2011) acknowledges some of the multilingual contexts that exist in schools, it is broadly framed as an English language document which does not address the multilingual environments in Irish-medium schools and in many English-medium schools. This paper presents a case study of two post-primary schools, one a linguistically diverse English-medium school and one an Irishmedium school, focusing on both the challenges and opportunities of linguistic diversity in the implementation of the LNLL strategy. The data derives from interviews with teachers, students and student-teachers.

Paper 3: Within and Without - Considering the power of competing educational discourses in our understanding of adolescent literacy practice, policy and research.

This paper draws on the shared empirical research and recently published book ('Networks of Mind: Language, Culture, Neuroscience', 2014) of the authors alongside Alicia's recent doctoral thesis research to explore the role of educational discourse in adolescent practice, policy and research. Current educational discourses look in (to brain) or out (to experience) to understand literacy and learning.

For many years, the ESAI Executive has submitted a symposium involving ESAI members, ensuring a range of institutions are represented with a symposium theme that provides some scope for a range of inputs and perspectives.

Despite the allure of neuroscience, neuroscientific insights which "look in" do not translate into educational practice without "looking out" to a broader understanding of the role of culture, environment, relationships in learning. The purpose of this paper is to interrogate adolescent literacy practice, policy and research using a cultural lens to investigate power, heritage and justice within and without neuroscientific and sociocultural discourses.

Paper 4: Culture, heritage and values in Irish education – perspectives in art and history

This paper is a critical review and evaluation of a mod-

ule in an Initial Teacher Education programme in an Irish art college. Through the production of original artworks, graduate students give personal responses to the values and foundational beliefs evident at key moments in 20th century Irish education history and policy. The art projects take various forms – 2D or 3D work in a variety of media, digital media projects or performative pieces. Students have chosen to address such issues as Irish language, corporal punishment, censorship, gender, sexuality, special needs and religion in Irish education. In presenting some of these artworks, the paper provides a critical commentary on the potential of the creative arts to inform teacher education programmes.

The Association has a strong record of involvement in convening policy seeding events and this is an aspect of the association's work which we plan to expand in the coming year.



FUNDING CALLS

The Irish Research Council (IRC)

The IRC has published terms and conditions of two postgraduate scholarship schemes: the Government of Ireland Postgraduate Scholarships Scheme (GOI) and the Employment Based Postgraduate Programme (EBP). Application dead-line is **4pm on 11th February 2014**. Terms and conditions are available at http://www.research.ie/funding/postgraduate-funding.

The Employment Based Programme is a relatively recent scheme under which research students are employed by a co-funding partner while pursuing a PhD or research masters programme. Any type of organization that deals with education issues (other than a higher education institution) can potentially act as employment partner. Research projects in all disciplines are eligible. If you are working in an agency/organisation and have an interest in pursuing postgraduate work, contact any of the Education Departments to see if you are eligible to apply for funding.

ESAI SYMPOSIUM AT BERA 2015: CALL FOR PAPERS FOR A SYMPOSIUM/FULL SYMPOSIUM

This year, the British Educational Research Association (BERA) will hold its annual conference in Belfast from 15th-17th September. In the spirit of collaboration, and because BERA are coming to Ireland, they have invited kindly ESAI to submit a symposium to their annual conference.

This year, we welcome applications from ESAI members to present their work at the symposium. In all, the symposium will include 4-5 papers over 90 minutes, which should include time for commentary, questions and discussion. The session will also have a chair and a discussant.

ESAI members are invited to submit a proposal for a complete symposium or alternatively, individual members may submit individual papers for consideration in a general symposium.
